معلومات أساسية عن الصف COURSE INFORMATION

Course Description: This course introduces the student to the fundamentals of Modern Standard Arabic (MSA) language and cultures. This course uses an interdisciplinary approach in an asynchronous online setting. Emphasis is placed on the development of fundamental communication skills of writing, reading, speaking, and listening using authentic language contexts. Besides learning about the language, we will also explore various areas of the world where Arabic is spoken.

Course materials and access to My Classroom, the online learning management system (LMS) utilized at American Military University, is available to each student.

Prerequisites or co-requisites منطلبات سابقة هذا الصف: This course requires a minimum of first year academic Arabic (ARAB100, ARAB101) or their equivalents. This prerequisite may not apply to proficient speakers of Arabic with some knowledge of the formal writing system of MSA. There are no specific courses that must be taken simultaneously with this course.

Course Goals الْهُوافُ الْعَامَةُ لِلْصَفَّ : The goals of this course are to prepare students to apply Arabic (MSA) language skills to future experiences in the language and are adopted from the ACTFL Proficiency Guidelines, 2012. The goal areas include the following:

Communication: interact and negotiate meaning in interpersonal situations; understand and interpret from a variety of topics

Cultures: investigate, explain, and reflect on the language and cultures studied **Connections**: build, reinforce, and expand on knowledge of a variety of disciplines using Arabic (MSA) language skills; develop critical thinking; evaluate diverse perspectives **Comparisons**: investigate, explain, and reflect on comparisons between Arabic (MSA) and their own language

Communities: interact and collaborate with speakers of Arabic (MSA) within their communities and in a global context; develop a lifelong enjoyment of learning the language

Course Objectives: At the end of this course, students will be able to use Arabic (MSA) to:

- Explain orally and/or in writing family and community relationships and cultural hierarchies
- Describe family, geography, social, and/or political features of the Middle East/North Africa (MENA) region.
- Demonstrate oral and written proficiency of nominal and verbal sentences
- Analyze sentence structures into component parts of subject/verb/object
- Compose sentences using appropriate grammatical structures for nominal and verbal sentences
- Compare grammatical structures to their own first language
- Revise simplistic and poorly written texts to appropriate and grammatically correct texts

Availability of Course Content: Course content becomes available to students at the beginning of the course, Midnight, Eastern Time. All work is due on Sundays, 11:59 PM Eastern Time. Each week, the course content will change to build on or advance from previous content. Students are authorized to work "ahead" in the course. Students may also contact the instructor to make-up work if falling behind in class.

Reading Exercises (2) (20%): Reading exercises are found under the Assignment Tab in My Classroom. After reading the lesson content and watching all lesson videos associated with the topic for the week, the student will complete

the **activities for the week** by Sunday, 11:59 PM Eastern Time. The Writing Activity coincides with the lesson content. Check the My Classroom calendar for more information.

DESCRIPTION OF LISTENING ASSIGNMENTS

Quizzes (2) (20%): Listening quizzes are found under the Quiz Tab in My Classroom. Content will be introduced in My Classroom each week each week and will contain topics such as family, community, geography, military, and politics. After reading the lesson content and watching all lesson videos associated with the topic for the week, the student will complete the **activity of the week** by Sunday, 11:59 PM Eastern Time. The listening activity each week will coincide with the lesson content. Listening assignments will be in the form of the student listening to short audio clips of either one or two speakers, and questions will be provided in the form of multiple choice, fill in the blank, and True/False questions to check comprehension. Students will have two attempts to complete each assignment to achieve the highest score possible. Check the My Classroom calendar for more information.

DESCRIPTION OF ORAL ASSIGNMENT

Oral Introduction (1) (Bonus) and Voice Thread (OPTIONAL): Oral Introduction and Voice Thread are under the Discussion Tab in My Classroom. At the beginning of the course, the student will submit an oral introduction in the discussion section. Voice Thread is an online tool to practice speaking asynchronously. This means that we join the speaking session at different times from all over the world. We do not need to meet at the same time to practice speaking. Here is the website to create an account: https://voicethread.com/ 1. In the lower left-hand corner of a lesson, press the play button and listen to the directions. 2. In the lower middle of the slide, press the comment button and choose the audio option to record your introduction on the slide. 3.
