Course : BUSN640 **Title :** Nonprofit Law, Governance, and Ethics

Description

Course Description: A survey of the legal structure that defines and regulates the nonprofit sector and an examination of fundamental governance issues in nonprofit corporations. The focus of the course is on the board of directors (trustees) and the executive director and their fiduciary responsibilities established both by law and by the moral imperatives from actions on behalf of the public interest.

Communicating on the Forum

- Forums are the heart of the interaction in this course. The more engaged and lively the exchanges, the more interesting and fun the course will be. Only substantive comments will receive credit. Although there is a final posting day/time after which the instructor will grade and provide feedback, it is not sufficient to wait until the last day to contribute your comments/questions on the forum. The purpose of the forums is to actively participate in an on-going discussion about the assigned content.
- "Substantial" engagement means comments that contribute something new and important to the discussion. Thus a message that simply says "I agree" is not substantial. A substantial comment contributes a new idea or perspective, a good follow-up question to a point made, offers a response to a question, provides an example or illustration of a key point, points out an inconsistency in an argument, etc.
- As a class, if we run into conflicting view points, we must respect each individual's own opinion. Hateful and hurtful comments towards other individuals, students, groups, peoples, and/or societies will not be tolerated.
- Students must post a response to the weekly forums prompt and post the required number of replies to

other students – refer to the grading rubric and/or forum instructions for specific expectations.

- The main response to the forum need to be provided mid-week – refer to the grading rubric and/or forum instructions for specific expectations.
- Replies must be posted in the week due and replies after the end of the each week will not be graded.
