Description

Course Description: The study and consideration of global environmental and climate change are of increasing significance to society. In this course, students will examine the evidence for and causes of global environmental change and will analyze potential impacts on environmental policy and society. Emphasis will be on the implications of environmental change for environmental managers, including management decision-making, the adequacy of the current regulatory framework in addressing these problems, and the effect on future policy and legislation.

Course Scope:

This course is a study of the topic of global environmental change, with an emphasis on the impacts on society as well as the environment. The primary learning approach used in this course will be student research and investigation, coupled with readings from peer-reviewed journals and scientific and government published reports.
