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Course Description (Catalog)

Study of wine manufacturing, quality criteria, and sensory standards for both U.S. and international wines; topics include history of wine in society, selection of wine for specific meals, and wine variations. Opportunities for students to purchase different types of wine and participate in evaluative tasting techniques are presented; however alternatives are available for students that choose not to, or may not legally, consume alcoholic beverages.

Course Scope

This course will present a foundation for understanding the history and production of wine in several cultures. Along with the historical context of wine production, the student will learn how to identify the different types of red, white, and sparkling wines, as well as selecting the appropriate wine for certain menu selections. Further, this course will provide the learner with basic wine management tips and techniques used in the wine/hospitality industry.
