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Course Description (Catalog)

Government and Security of Russia

Explores historic, cultural, economic, and geographic traits that characterize the Russian state and shape the domestic political processes and interstate relations. Critically compares the

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politics, governments and orientations of post-Soviet states and other regional powers. Surveys contemporary regional issues such as ethnic conflict, nationalism and political-economic reforms, with a particular emphasis on security concerns.

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Course Scope

As a 300-level course, this course provides a foundation of knowledge that the student will use in the International Relations program to be successful in higher level courses. The purpose and scope of this course is to provide the student with the educational concepts on which to build a deeper understanding of Intelligence.

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Course Objectives

After successfully completing this course, you will be able to:

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CO 1: Explain the political transition period in Russia.

CO 2: Apply an understanding of the Russian political transition to the basic pillars of contemporary Russian politics.

CO 3: Evaluate the Russian media's role in influencing public policy

CO 4: Analyze the distribution of political power in the Russian political system.

CO 5: Deconstruct the structural aspects of the Russian economy.

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Course Delivery Method

This course, delivered via distance learning, will enable students to complete academic work in a flexible manner, completely online. Course resources and access to an online learning management system will be available to each student. Online assignments are due by Sunday at 11:55 pm ET and include all written assignments, examinations, and research papers submitted for grading. Weekly Forum questions (accomplished in groups in a Forum) require an initial response by Thursday at 11:55 pm ET, with all other required responses due by Sunday at 11:55 pm ET. The assigned faculty will support the students throughout this eight-week course.

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Evaluation Procedures

Forum discussions – 40 percent

Each week, a discussion question is provided and posts should reflect an assimilation of the readings. Students are required to provide a substantive initial post by Thursday at 11:55 pm ET and respond to 2 or more classmates by Sunday 11:55 pm ET. Forum posts are graded on timeliness, relevance, knowledge of the weekly readings, and the quality of original ideas.

Progress assignment - 30 percent

A 3-4 page essay that requires a thesis and includes research and analysis.

Final assignment – 30 percent

This assignment is a take-home essay assignment. The use of required texts and readings from this course is mandatory.

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Online Library

The Online Library is available to enrolled students and faculty from inside the electronic campus.
