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# Course Description (Catalog)

# IRLS 460 Government and Politics in the Middle East (3 hours)

This course examines historic, economic, social, and geographic traits that distinguish this region and shape its domestic political processes and interstate relations. Surveys the governments of selected countries, considering factors such as legitimacy and political development. Includes a survey of contemporary issues salient in the region, including the Arab-Israeli dispute, with particular focus on regional security concerns.

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#### Course Scope

As a 400-level course, this course provides a higher level of knowledge building on the material taught at the 300 level. The purpose and scope of this course is to enable the student to build a deeper understanding of the discipline.

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#### **Course Objectives**

After successfully completing this course, you will be able to:

**CO 1** Explain the root causes of contemporary political, economic, and religious challenges to regional security and stability in the Middle East

**CO2** Analyze the effects of the rise political Islamism on political development and stability in the Middle East

**CO3** Evaluate the impact of the Shi'a-Sunni divide on regional stability

**CO4** Assess the effects of the Arab Spring on regional security and political development in the Middle East

**CO5** Apply contending theoretical models of conflict and cooperation to the prospects for the Arab-Israeli peace process

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#### **Course Delivery Method**

This course, delivered via distance learning, will enable students to complete academic work in a flexible manner, completely online. Course resources and access to an online learning management system will be available to each student. Online assignments are due by Sunday at 11:55 pm ET and include all written assignments, examinations, and research papers submitted for grading. Weekly Forum questions (accomplished in groups in a Forum) require an initial response by Thursday at 11:55 pm ET, with all other required responses due by Sunday at 11:55 pm ET. The assigned faculty will support the students throughout this eight-week course.

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#### **Evaluation Procedures**

#### Forum discussions – 25 percent

Each week, a discussion question is provided and posts should reflect an assimilation of the readings. Students are required to provide a substantive initial post by Thursday at 11:55 pm ET and respond to 2 or more classmates by Sunday 11:55 pm ET. Forum posts are graded on timeliness, relevance, knowledge of the weekly readings, and the quality of original ideas.

# Midterm assignment - 25 percent

This assignment is a take-home essay assignment of 2 questions. Each answer will be 2-3 pages in length (double-spaced, 12pt font). The questions are designed to test your knowledge and assimilation of the course objectives. The exclusive use of required texts and readings from this course is mandatory. The assignment will be available in the "Assignments" folder.

# Progress assignment - 25 percent

You will write a Case Study assessing the prospects for a long-term peaceful resolution to the Israeli-Arab conflict. This case study will be 8-10 pages in length, and will be based on at least six peer-reviewed academic sources. More specific instructions for the paper can be found in the "Assignments" folder.

# Final assignment – 25 percent

This assignment is a take-home essay assignment of 2 questions. Each answer will be 2-3 pages in length (double-spaced, 12pt font). The questions are designed to test your knowledge and assimilation of the course objectives. The exclusive use of required texts and readings from this course is mandatory. The assignment will be available in the "Assignments" folder.
