Course Description (Catalog)

This course provides the critical elements of analytical and intellectual examination and reflection of certain core issues in the practice of leadership. The purpose of the course is to gain a better understanding of leadership from multiple angles and perspectives. Students will explore the different ways leadership has been defined and studied; similarities and contradictions among current leadership theories and the way leadership has been exercised in business, military, and political contexts.

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Course Scope

This course provides a focus on the problems, concepts and techniques of leading people in organizations. It is intended to stand alone although it uses skills developed in other courses. The course is built on the premise that every manager is a leader and can improve his or her leadership skills, given the concepts and the incentive. This course stressed on the importance of skill development, especially the basic skills that have a known impact on one's success. Likewise, skillful leadership can influence employees in a positive direction.
