This course examines the elements of contemporary leadership and delineates the principles that are important in the development of a leader for the 21st century. Discussion of the role and function of leadership will include an in-depth analysis and study of needs affecting individuals, organizations, and society. This course provides students with leadership skills and competencies on which to build an individual model for effective leadership that can be tested over time.
