Course Summary

Description

Course Description: Senior Seminar in Psychology is the capstone course of the BA in Psychology degree. Students completing this course will investigate career opportunities in the field and professional organizations supporting practitioners in field specialty areas, build knowledge and skills needed for next steps following degree completion for undergraduates applying to graduate school or seeking post-baccalaureate employment, demonstrate an ability to locate and synthesize scholarly published material, and interview a professional in the field. Prerequisite: Completion of a minimum of 106 hours towards your program.

Course Scope:

The Senior Seminar in Psychology incorporates knowledge domains from the undergraduate Psychology degree program, including fundamental and advance discipline related concepts. It provides opportunities for students to demonstrate what they have learned during their academic careers and to prepare for entering their respective professional field and graduate studies specialties.

- CO2: Evaluate information sources available to professionals in the field of psychology
- CO3: Investigate professional associations in the field of psychology
- CO4: Compare and contrast sources of information about career opportunities in the field of psychology

- CO6: Construct an APA formatted annotated bibliography
- CO7: Conduct an informational interview of a professional in the field of psychology

Evaluation

Weeks 1 through 8: Forums

Students will engage in interactive dialogs with classmates and their instructor on Forums located in the online classroom. General posting instructions and weekly Forum topics are located on each Forum.

Week 3: Professional Associations Review and Report

Students will research each of 5 assigned professional associations relevant to the field of psychology and write a one and a half page summary of its purpose, function, mission, benefits and resources it offers to association members and the general public, if public resources are available.

Week 4: Annotated Bibliography

An APA formatted bibliography annotating 6 articles selected from the APUS Online Library is required by the end of Week 4.

Week 5: Career Opportunities Research and Report

Students will research and report on career opportunities in the field of psychology using the [Occupational Outlook Handbook](http://www.bls.gov/oco/) located on <http://www.bls.gov/oco/> and publications of the [American Psychological Association](http://www.APA.org) on <http://www.APA.org>. Other credible sources should be sought to find required information as well. These two resources are expected to be starting points for finding the needed information.

Week 7: Interview a Professional in the Field

Students will develop a set of questions to be asked during an interview of a professional in the field of psychology. Student-developed interview questions will be posted to the Week 3 discussion forum for instructor review and classroom dialogue.

IMPORTANT NOTE: Collaboration on coursework, unless so assigned by the course instructor, is not permitted. All written assignments must be in the student's own words, correctly source crediting published authors for any paraphrases or quotes used in the work. Quotes should be used very sparingly (i.e., not more than 2 per paper) and must be placed inside quotation marks, and submitted error free and in accordance with APA formatting rules and with APUS writing standards found in the Student Handbook on the left screen menu of the e-classroom. ANY copying from the Internet or other

published sources found in any coursework submission, including Forums, will result in an automatic score of zero with no opportunity for revision and a failing grade for the course following a second instance.

Communicating on the Forum

- Forums are the heart of the interaction in this course. The more engaged and lively the exchanges, the more interesting and fun the course will be. Only substantive comments will receive credit. Although there is a final posting day/time after which the instructor will grade and provide feedback, you are strongly discouraged from waiting until the due date to contribute your comments/questions on the forum. The purpose of the forums is to actively participate in an on-going discussion about the assigned content.
- "Substantive" means comments that contribute something new and important to the discussion. Thus a message that simply says "I agree", even if wordy and thus, meets the length requirement, is not substantive. A substantive comment contributes a new idea or perspective, a good follow-up question to a point made, offers a response to a question, provides an example or illustration of a key point, points out an inconsistency in an argument, etc.
- As a class, if we run into conflicting view points, we must respect each other as colleagues. Hateful, aggressive, or hurtful comments towards other individuals, students, groups, peoples, and/or societies will not be tolerated.
- Students must post a response to the weekly forums prompt and post the required number of replies to other students – refer to the grading rubric and/or forum instructions for specific expectations on number of replies and word count requirements.

Quizzes and Exams

- Quizzes and exams may consist of true/false, multiple choice, and short essay questions. Each quiz/exam is accessible only once. Once a quiz/exam is accessed, you will not be able to access it again if you disconnect. Therefore, allocate time to complete your assessments.
