Course Description:

This course will explore the unique psychology associated with military deployment, both for the person being deployed and their family and loved ones. Military culture, common psychological difficulties such as depression and PTSD, as well as provider self-care and burnout will be discussed.

Course Scope:

This course provides an overview of the primary concepts and theory in deployment psychology with specific attention on understanding the stressors associated with deployment both for the Service member and their family.. The course focuses on the challenges and threats of combat deployment, combat and operational stress control, post-deployment adjustment, and transitioning through the deployment cycle.

 2. Evaluate the challenges and threats of combat deployments.
 3. Apply knowledge of combat and operational stress control (COSC) in terms of traumatic event management and identifying those who need care.

 5. Analyze the types of mental health interventions employed pre-, during, and post-deployment and articulate the general principles of effective preventive, short-term, and long-term psychiatric interventions.
